- ✓ Cross-regional, comparative program of research: Teams in each region collaborating on common projects that address issues of national interest
- ✓ Responsiveness to local needs: Regional nodes also work on issues of more local concern

- ✓ Innovation focus: Focus on identifying and analyzing promising practices, with a view to facilitating their transfer across locations and areas of practice
- ✓ Support for outcomes measurement: Support for evidence-based programming through targeted research on outcomes and performance measurement
- ✓ Support for Local Immigration Partnerships as they roll out across the country, and for similar placebased initiatives
