- Funded by IRCC as Toronto's city-wide Local Immigration Partnership (LIP)



City of Toronto Refugee Resettlement Program

Total to Canada: 34,696 (as of Nov 4th)

Total to Ontario: 12,450

Total to Toronto: > 5,000

- Implementation through Toronto Newcomer Office
- Goal to mobilize existing supports, while facilitating enhancements where needed
- Focus on strategies that can create the most impact

Initial Priorities


- Appropriate supports for PSRs and their sponsors

Key Outcomes

- Children's Services provided childcare at the Plaza Hotel for children ages 0-8.
- Parks, Forestry & Recreation drop-in program attended by over 200 children and youth ages 8-16 staying at the Plaza Hotel.
- Over 4000 doses of vaccine administered by Toronto Public Health to approximately 1,800 Syrian newcomers at temporary hotel sites.
- School-readiness programs held by TDSB/TCSDB, attended by over 500 refugee children staying at hotel sites.



Cross-Sectoral Collaboration

- Inter-Divisional Team
- Inter-Agency Task Force
- Ongoing communication with all levels of government
- Ongoing communication with City divisions
- Collaboration with Quadrant LIPs and other community agencies

- Integrated service planning for 'Month 13'
- Ensuring appropriate supports for Syrian children & youth
- Ongoing coordination of rent supplement program
- Expansion of Newcomer Services in City Facilities
