



Call for Abstracts

Second Annual Junior Scholars Workshop in Migration

Are you a doctoral candidate or a recent PhD with a journal manuscript that could benefit from feedback? Are you interested in learning more about the publication process?

The Sociology of Migration Research Cluster at the Canadian Sociological Association (CSA) and The Pathways to Prosperity Partnership's (P2P) Standing Committee for Student Engagement invite graduate students from all disciplines to participate in a one-day workshop during the 86th meeting of the Congress of the Humanities and Social Sciences in Toronto, ON.

This workshop will provide selected panelists with the opportunity to receive extensive and formative feedback on an unpublished manuscript from a faculty expert in the field. Discussion of individual papers will include a brief summary of the paper by its author, faculty feedback, and attendee questions and discussion.

Workshop participants are required to register for Congress and are responsible for arranging Congress registration, accommodation, and travel. Some funding support for travel is available.

Graduate students and junior scholars with migration-related research interests who would like to learn more about writing and review processes are also invited to attend the workshop and participate in providing feedback to their peers.

Eligibility Criteria

- ABD or up to two-years from granting of PhD
- Paper topic broadly connected to the sociology of migration

Please submit an 800 to 1200-word abstract through the CSA abstract submission system (<https://www.csa-scs.ca/conference/call-for-abstracts/>) no later than January 27, 2017.
