HIPC is a community table that seeks to create a seamless settlement experience for immigrants in Hamilton. With partners from various sectors – including settlement, education, business, health, social services, municipal affairs, and persons with lived immigration experience -- we work together to create a welcoming community with relevant and accessible services.

HIPC was established in 2009 as one of Canada's first local immigration partnerships, a network that has now spread across the country and includes more than 75 similar local initiatives. We are housed within the City of Hamilton's Economic Development Division and funded by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada.


Communications

HIPC believes in the value of keeping the community engaged and informed through active presence at the podium, around the table, and online. HIPC creates inclusive messaging through different channels.




SOCIAL MEDIA

Newcomer Day

HIPC hosted the second annual Newcomer Day at City Hall on Friday, June 14, 2019. This year's event included an expanded stage show entertainment, school visits, and food trucks. For the first time, HIPC organized a Marketplace as part of the festivities, to advocate for and support newcomer business owners.



CommuniTea - Cup and Conversation



Launched by HIPC at our 2019 Newcomer Day, CommuniTea events are intended to create short-term community over tea and conversations about immigration. Newcomer volunteers act as table hosts and conversation facilitators at every CommuniTea event. HIPC hosted four CommuniTea events this year.

In honour of World Mental Health Day in October, HIPC joined with other local agencies to host the 2019 Multicultural Wellness Fair. The event was created to provide education about mental health and community



resources to culturally diverse populations in Hamilton. Keynote speaker Marisa Mariella, an educator and Vice Chair of the Suicide Prevention Community Council of Hamilton, led a CommuniTea circle in which participants discussed mental wellness across cultures.

Also in October, HIPC hosted a public CommuniTea event at the Ancaster Farmers Market. Hamilton-based traveling tea trailer Tea Amo provided a variety of teas originating from different parts of the world from China to Germany to Ireland.

HIPC RECOGNIZED BY COLLÈGE BORÉAL




HIPC RECEIVES CERTIFICATE OF RECOGNITION FROM HON. AHMED HUSSEN

HIPC Celebrates 10 Years



In 2009, Hamilton Immigration Partnership Council became one of Canada's first local immigration partnerships. Local immigration partnerships were a pilot initiative, and their tenure was uncertain. Within two years, Hamilton had its first-ever Immigration Strategy and Action Plan, endorsed by City Council.

Today, HIPC is one of more than 75 local immigration partnerships from coast to coast. Over the years, HIPC has convened a wide range of service providers and newcomers, nurtured relationships, hosted dozens of events, created resources to help immigrants and refugees access services, and spearheaded original research focusing on the well-being of newcomers in Hamilton. In everything it undertakes, HIPC has advocated for a welcoming and inclusive Hamilton for All.



HIPC marked its tenth anniversary at a special Annual Event held on March 10. All former HIPC Chairs and former project managers were in attendance for this occasion, as were many past and present HIPC members and partners as well as representatives from IRCC. Short remarks were given by Mayor Fred Eisenberger -- mayor when HIPC launched in 2009 -and HIPC's first staff lead Tim Rees. Attendees enjoyed photo boards, displays of HIPC materials, and an engagement exercise about HIPC's future direction.

Research, Planning and Knowledge Mobilization

This year HIPC released two reports and initiated a collective impact process to help us focus our work and increase our effectiveness. HIPC staff presented to various public and invited audiences about immigration in Hamilton and the work of HIPC, including Hamilton Community Foundation, City of Hamilton Housing and Homelessness Advisory Committee, a public forum at Hamilton Public Library, and two McMaster University courses.

RESEARCH REPORTS

FINDING A PLACE TO CALL HOME: AN ENVIRONMENTAL SCAN OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING ACROSS CANADA

HIPC's Research and Evaluation Committee identified housing as a priority area of research. HIPC engaged McMaster Research Shop to learn about affordable housing initiatives in other Canadian cities that could serve as models for efforts in Hamilton. Their environmental scan focused on initiatives and projects that have successfully helped newcomers to Canada secure housing.

Results from the environmental scan of newcomer affordable housing initiatives in major urban cities across Canada identified six programs with promising features and the greatest chance for replicability in Hamilton. All these programs provided emergency shelter or transitional housing, as well as housing stabilization support, which included accommodation search and advocacy support.

HAMILTON'S NEWCOMER SERVICES: MAPPING THE PRESENT, VISIONING THE POSSIBLE

Initiated by HIPC's Coordination of Services Committee, this project was driven by the question of whether Hamilton's newcomers would benefit from the addition of mobile services. The starting point was to increase our understanding of where newcomers live with respect to where services are located. To this end, HIPC staff undertook an engagement exercise with local service providers to identify newcomer-focused services and then worked with a student team from McMaster to categorize and map these services. HIPC staff also examined alternatives to the predominant in-person model of service delivery for newcomers.

The need for new service delivery models is urgent. Settlement services were being rethought and redrawn even as this report was being written.

COLLECTIVE IMPACT WORK

What future do we want for Hamilton's newcomers and for those of us who want to help them succeed? We start by dreaming big, then we break it down to tangible, manageable bits.

To help with this process, HIPC has been working with Innoweave to develop a collective impact framework to guide HIPC's actions in the next five years. A team of five HIPC members – Lily Lumsden, Ines Rios, Judy Travis, Jim Vanderveken and Olive Wahoush – are working with HIPC staff and Social Impact Advisors to create and validate a Theory of Change. The team has met more than a dozen times to identify, discuss and



agree on interim and long-term outcomes for Hamilton, including for newcomers and other Hamilton residents.

Validation work spearheaded by Huyen Dam included one-on-one interviews, focus groups with English language learners, a public-facing survey, and engagement activities at several HIPC events. As HIPC arrives at the end of this conceptualization phase, we look forward to focusing on implementation.

IRCC financially supported this work through the McConnell Foundation.



HIPC Events



In July, HIPC and Neighbour to Neighbour Centre hosted a community lunch connecting HIPC partners with long-term and recent immigrants. Attendees prepared a meal together, connected over delicious dolma, and viewed HIPC's video on informal settlement networks.



HIPC hosted events for grassroots community leaders, connecting them to information and resources on topics such as avoiding fraud. Shown here: October workshop on accessing funding, with a presentation from the Hamilton Funders Network.



HIPC and the YMCA hosted a Mentorship Appreciation Breakfast for City of Hamilton staff and internationally-trained mentees in February. The event included a professional development presentation on leveraging the mentor-mentee relationship.



HIPC Partnered with New Horizons Media and Mohawk College to host the first Immigrant Business Expo in Hamilton in November 2019. It featured a keynote speech by Mohamad Fakih, CEO of Paramount Fine Foods and Chairman Fakih Foundation.



HIPC's annual Service Provider Day focused on navigating newcomer mental health access and resources for frontline service staff. Local experts in the mental health shared information with 70 attendees at the February event.



Along with other Hamilton service providers, HIPC attended the National Pathways to Prosperity Conference in Toronto in November. Sarah Wayland moderated a plenary session on attraction and retention of immigrants to smaller communities.
