Successes

Since April 2022:

- National Steering Committee established 90 members
 [bi-weekly, bi-lingual & same day notes]
- □ Weekly P/T hub coordinating meetings
- Corporate & Cash Donation Structure/Process
 [ISED Portal over \$1.5million received and distributed to date]

Data Analysis Projects - eg pre and post arrival survey

Challenges

- □ As of Oct 26, 645,392 CUAET applications, 338,276 approved, 70+k settled in Canada
- As a Temporary Resident movement, no centralized data source for pre-arrival planning, ability to press pause, handle like refugee movement but not refugees
- Housing availability immediate and long-term and no IRCC funded settlement program for housing search
- Pre-Arrival Services how to get critical information to those contemplating settling in
 Canada? Is there a way to link Ukrainians to potential employers before arriving in Canada?
 How do we encourage settlement outside larger urban settings?
- Access to National Settlement Program versus growing wait-list in language assessment and LINC classes, as one example
- Post-Arrival Survey critical insights including the fact that 84% of respondent (1,600 respondents out 4,000)would like to convert to permanent residency after their CUAET visa expire





Lessons learned

Being prepared for future humanitarian movements "moving away from building the car (operation) while driving"

- The importance/strengthening traditional/nontraditional partnerships/collaboration e.g. Fed depts, private sector
- Existing infrastructure to enable a quick response
- Consistent transparency among all stakeholders
- □ A centralized national point of contact
- □ Rapid communication
- Importance of data
- Everyone benefits from the sharing of promising and innovative practices
