2017 – 2018 High volume of HR abuses reported by Migrant Workers to NGOs and Consulates

- Over 70% of migrant worker housing in the agricultural sector was substandard.
- High volume of complaints of bullying and harassment from employers to migrant workers in every industry.
 - Mainly agriculture, construction, caregiving and hospitality.
- Lack of support and information regarding how to access the health system.
- Lack of access to exercise any type of right in their own language
- Unawareness of what their rights were.
- Inadequate or inexistant coordination among authorities, agencies or any institution employing or servicing Migrant Workers.
- Need to update all related policies.

Agencies and Consulates call for action:

- Emergency meetings with Federal, Provincial and Municipal authorities.
- Permanent lines of communications were created.
- Support teams were created address emergencies
- Working teams to address policy issues were created

Two main results:

- Employment and Social Development Canada created a unique grass roots pilot program that welcomed all NGOs, authorities, consulates and related institutions to work together.
- Consular Alliance: the diplomatic corps unite to protect their national

Emergency Response: BC Floods

- Collaborative efforts between agencies, consulates, Ministry of Agriculture, churches, community groups
- Delivery of groceries, warm winter clothing, and other essential items to displaced workers
- Transportation support in cases of emergency evacuation
- Led MOSAIC to be the first settlement agency to become part of the Integrated Disaster Council of B.C.






Success stories of the Program:

- Sharing information to protect Migrant Workers.
- Connect with Federal and Provincial authorities as a united front:
- To advocate for necessary changes in policy.:
- A) Temporary Foreign Worker Protection Act.
- B) Housing overview through consultations.
- COVID19 Pandemic:
 - To work with Provincial authorities in coordinating the arrival of workers to hotels near YVR during the COVID19 Pandemic.
- Connect with 22 agencies that support workers throughout BC in emergencies and severe abuse cases through MOSAIC.

MOSAIC represent Migrant Workers on the Board of Agsafe.



Mental health in the post-covid era:

- Lack of possibility to connect due to isolation.
- Reduced access to culturally sensitive mental health support.
- Leaving family back home creates extra stress.
- Fear of stigma prevents workers from reaching out for help.
- Lack of financial resources might prevent them from reaching out.
- Language barrier to access services is common.
