Challenges

- 8 days to strategically plan and get the engagement structure in place
- No playbook to inform us, had to collaboratively enact along the way
- Secretariat staffing challenges and expansion (4)
- Deployment of resettlement staff to 4 regional hotels in Toronto
- Housing availability and movement to smaller centres
- Employee wellness
- Afghan refugee employment
