Canada's immigration landscape is changing

Recent years have seen historic population growth driven by immigration



- Canadian population grew by over 1 million people in 2022
- Immigration accounted for 95.5% of the growth

The 2024-26 Immigration Levels Plan was tabled in Parliament on November 1st



Global instability is leading to growing humanitarian needs



Canada welcomed many Protected Persons and Refugees, including from areas of global crisis such as Afghanistan, many of whom had complex needs

Number of refugees receiving Resettlement Assistance Program services



Canada also responded rapidly and created a **new emergency program to support Ukrainians** fleeing
the war

Recent volumes of newcomers add pressure on services; changing immigration patterns impact newcomers' needs

Sustained high volumes of newcomers adds pressures on services...

Estimated 350K new households in 2022 due to immigration, above the 208K net housing units built

...but also helps grow the economy and address labour shortages in key sectors.

Added an estimated 560K new workers in 2022

Increasing TR-to-PR transitions are changing what services newcomers need and when

From 2016- 2021, 36.6% of immigrants admitted had pre-admission experience living in Canada, compared with 17.9% among longer-term immigrants


PRs more concentrated in metropolitan areas, suggesting more work to attract and retain newcomers in small/rural communities


92.2% of immigrants in 2021 lived in a CMA, compared to 67.7% of those born in Canada.

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
The Settlement Program has adapted well to recent changes, even as client volumes increase and services were disrupted by the pandemic





The Program has innovated

- Supported sector in rapid move to digital/hybrid delivery during pandemic, and equipped agency staff to deliver
- Tested new approaches to service delivery
- Piloted new needs assessment and referral approaches
- Funded equity-focused projects, including the Racialized Newcomer Women Pilot



While the share of settlement clients that are **ECONOMIC** immigrants is decreasing.

We are also making progress on Francophone immigration and settlement

- Achieved target to welcome 4.4% in 2022 of French speaking immigrants outside of Québec, with new targets of 6% of total immigration in 2024, 7% in 2025 and 8% in 2026.
- Favorable context for Francophone immigration: modernized
 Official Languages Act and additional investments in the
 Action Plan for Official Languages 2023-2028.
- Investing approximately \$60M annually in the **Francophone Integration Pathway**, a suite of services offered in French by Francophone service providers.
- Increased number of Francophone SPOs (from 50 in 2018 to nearly 80 in 2022), resulting in better coverage of all service streams.
- Increased use of Francophone services by French-speaking clients.





Measuring client needs and outcomes shows that we are helping clients progress towards achieving their immediate settlement outcomes




The majority of clients directly participate in the Canadian labour market



Among those not working, 46% of clients said they are looking for work or starting work soon.


Many of those who aren't working/not planning to work contribute to Canada in other ways.



The 2024 Call for Proposals will renew Settlement and Resettlement Assistance Programming, and make advancements on key priorities areas









Increasing national consistency and standardization:

Ensuring clients can access services of comparable quality and content no matter where they are in Canada, and that organizations have the capacity to offer this.

Enhancing collaboration and coordination:

Building on and expanding collaboration between organizations, provincial, municipal and private sector partners.

Maintaining flexibility and efficiency:

Remaining efficient, nimble and flexible to adapt services to specific needs (e.g. of communities, clients, PT partners).

Expanding access to services:

Ensuring broader coverage, access and visibility of services, including through digital delivery and in rural and remote communities and in small and medium centres.

Resettlement Assistance Programming will be reinforced in CFP 2024

Port of Entry services, and Immediate and Essential supports including temporary accommodation and assistance in finding permanent accommodation.

Supports for GARs and other eligible clients

Expansion of the RAP to new communities where there is a demonstrated need and experience in successfully resettling refugees.

Expanding RAP coverage

Registration and referrals to other government and community services, ensuring clients are supported during their settlement journey.

Transition from the RAP to Settlement

Through CFP 2024, we are also introducing three new funding streams to ensure capacity to support dedicated priorities and needs

Francophone Integration Pathway (FIP)

Funding a **suite of settlement services in French** that includes all the direct and indirect service components of the Settlement and Resettlement Assistance Program.

Equity Stream

Funding intermediary organizations to redistribute funds and **support not-currently funded grassroots organizations that serve and are representative of equity-deserving groups**, in order to build their capacity to effectively deliver settlement services.

Service Delivery Improvement (SDI)

Funding to 5-year, larger-scale pilot projects that will test promising practices or concepts inspired by previous SDI Expression of Interest processes.

Key Takeaways

- The provision of settlement services remains integral to attract and retain newcomers to Canada, and is critical to maintaining public support for immigration.
- While sustained levels of immigration to Canada has resulted in increased pressure on settlement services, the (Re)Settlement programs continue to adapt to meet the changing needs of newcomers.
- Our **robust data collection** helps us to measure our successes and to identify where there are gaps in service provision, enabling us to make client-driven decisions.
- The 2024 Call for Proposals presents an exciting step forward in offering service continuity and Program stability, while embarking on deliberate advancements informed by data and evidence to ensure we get the right services, to the right clients, at the right time.
