


"If Employment is the Holy Grail of Settlement, Why Aren't We Better at It?"

FACT:

There is no settlement without employment. Why are we not focused on this?

Last year, Canada admitted 120,822 principal applicants and their accompanying family members (56,888 females and 63,934 males) as permanent residents through Express Entry.

The economic immigration class is the largest source of permanent resident admissions, at approximately 58% of all admissions in 2023. In 2023, the number of individuals admitted to Canada under the Economic Class totaled 272,744, which is 6.7% higher than in 2022. From this number, 127,961 females were admitted to Canada under the Economic Class compared to 144,783 males.




Hundreds of thousands of newcomers ask on various social media platforms: does the government help us get jobs?

It's important to be aware that for most newcomers, the reality is that the government's support in job placement is limited. IRCC funds employment-related services at the lowest out of six parameters

This could be why less than 20% of newcomers go to a settlement agency

While IRCC-funded programs exist for information and language services, employment are limited.



In 2020-21 and 2021-22, and in line with previous years, language assessment and training services was the largest spending category, representing 30% of expenditures.





Let's do the math



9% of Economic class 388,000 out of \$142M total \$366 per person

- IRCC lowest employment priority (Basic resume and interview services funded)
- ESDC Employment priority linked with Regulated Professions only (Average 20% of total)

What is needed?

- Most settlement agencies cover basic employment information, not profession specific.
- Immigrants come with experience in hundreds of professions, regulated and unregulated.
- Newcomers need to speak to immigrants working in their fields to understand how they got employed.
- The only way to do that is to learn how to use a network.
- Learn advanced LinkedIn strategies
- A network that transcends geographic locations and other limiters.
- Ideally, a digital network that combines Networking,
 Mentorship and Coaching






How do you prefer accessing services?







What would you suggest newcomers do when they land in Canada?






Immigrant Networks Survey Results

Does the Immigrant Networks networking program help you prepare for your job search?


Yes 82.35% No 17.65%


