- MOSAIC has a longstanding tradition of providing a number of essential support services to various immigration populations, specifically refugees and asylum seekers










What's In a Name?

Refugee

A person who has been forced to flee their country because of persecution, war, or violence

Government Assisted	Privately Sponsored	Asylum Seeker/ Refugee
Refugee (GAR)	Refugee (PSR)	Claimant
Resettled refugee who receives support on their arrival from the government for 1 year	Resettled refugee who receives support on their arrival from private groups for 1 year	A person who has made a claim for protection as a refugee. They will receive a decision on whether they are refugees after their arrival to Canada



Canadian Housing Context

Over 1 in 10 Canadians reported they had experienced some form of homeslessness in their lifetime

By 2022, nearly half of Canadians expressed concerns about their ability to afford housing, and 10% reported experiencing hidden homelessness, such as couch surfing.

In 2024, the federal government launched a new housing plan to expand affordable housing, increase housing supply, enhance renter protections, and combat homelessness.



Housing Needs of Refugees in BC

78% of Vancouver emergency shelters reported an increase in refugees

Refugees in BC, particularly in Metro Vancouver, face significant challenges in securing safe and affordable housing. Their precarious immigration status, limited financial resources, and lack of local rental history often make it difficult to find stable accomodations. This is compounded by the region's high rates of homelessness and critical shortage of affordable housing options. Additionally, refugees often have multi-faceted needs such as access to employment, language services, and community support, which further complicates their housing search and long-term stability.


